About Us

The [Oxford Centre for Emerging Minds Research](#) (OCEMR) is focused on conducting world-class research with children and young people that promotes a world where their differences are understood and accepted, strengths are capitalised on, and mental health difficulties are prevented or addressed early.

The Centre is jointly hosted by the Departments of Experimental Psychology and Psychiatry and is located in the Life and Mind Building in the centre of Oxford.

Staff and students in the Oxford Centre for Emerging Minds Research are working together to address our shared values:

- To embed the voices and experiences of children, young people and families throughout our work to ensure it meets the needs of those who stand to benefit, including among families with characteristics that are typically under-represented in services and research;
- To recognise, affirm and capitalise on individual differences (e.g.: neurodivergence) and strengths to promote good mental health and wellbeing;
- To engage policy makers, practitioners, education providers, and voluntary and community sector organisations to ensure that our work is informed by their needs and to ensure rapid implementation in practice;
- To inform the general public about our work to influence the wider narrative about mental health, well-being, and neurodiversity in children and young people in ways that promote understanding, acceptance, and valuing of differences, and ultimately bring benefits to society.

About the Opportunities

Thanks to generous funding from the Paul Foundation, we are able to offer up to four fully funded OCEMR DPhil (PhD) studentships from October 2027. The studentships will provide a stipend and fees for three years at the UK home fees rate. Due to our funding, the studentships will need to be completed by October 2030.

We have a number of potential DPhil project opportunities all of which contribute towards our shared research aims:

- Understanding how children and young people's strengths, aptitudes and interests can be identified and capitalised on to promote good mental health and development.
- Identifying the key mechanisms that underpin mental health in children and young people and how they can be targeted to promote good mental health and to prevent and treat emerging mental health problems.

Candidate profile

We welcome ambitious applicants with at least an upper second-class honours degree (or equivalent) and/or a relevant Master's degree in Psychology or a related discipline that is relevant to your proposed research.

Applicants should demonstrate experience of high calibre independent research. Experience as a research assistant or in a clinical setting is desirable. We particularly welcome applicants interested in interdisciplinary research and collaborative work with young people and stakeholders. Excellent communication and collaboration skills are essential. We are committed to equality, diversity, and inclusion and encourage applications from candidates of all backgrounds, particularly those currently under-represented at the University of Oxford.*

	By 29 October	All candidates who submitted an expression of interest will be informed whether their preferred supervisor is able to support progression of their DPhil application.
Stage 2	November 2026	Selected candidates and supervisors work together to prepare for departmental graduate admissions process including developing up project proposal and preparing for interview.

Interested students are requested to submit their CV, academic transcripts and supporting statement to ocemr@psy.ox.ac.uk by midday on 22 September (Stage 1 deadline). Only these three documents will be considered by potential supervisors and the OCEMR team and no additional documents are required at this stage.

Guidance for applicants for Stage 1 expressions of interest

In order to submit a Stage 1 expression of interest, all applicants should submit the following documents by email to ocemr@psy.ox.ac.uk:

1. **CV**
2. **Supporting Statement (750 words)**
3. **Transcripts of University level qualifications taken to date (including those in progress)**

In your CV (maximum of 2 pages) please include:

Any research publications (including pre-prints, under review and in press)

- Any research experience (e.g., placements, internships, independent thesis)
- Names, roles and institutions of 2 referees that you plan to ask to provide references for you. Note your referees will need to speak to your academic achievements and potential, and suitability for graduate work.

In your supporting statement (maximum of 750 words in total) please include:

- Up to 300 words on why you would like to undertake a DPhil and why you are a suitable candidate
- Up to 300 words noting your preferred project(s) (and a second choice if applicable), what interests you about your preferred project(s) and how you are a suitable candidate for the specific project (s).
- The University of Oxford is committed to increasing the participation of students from under-represented backgrounds across all its programmes. Please note any relevant information related to equality, diversity and inclusion.* (up to 150 words)
- Please note the final word count for each section in your supporting statement

The transcripts included in your expression of interest should be added as attachments. Please ensure that they include all your undergraduate and postgraduate grades to date. Acceptable formats at this stage include screenshots from your student portal, but all transcripts must include your name, the awarding institution and a breakdown of all grades.

- If AI tools are used in this application, they must be consistent with the Oxford University Policy for Using Generative AI in research. Substantive original writing by Gen AI, including either verbatim or closely paraphrased use of Gen AI content is not permissible. If you choose to use AI tools, please include a statement in your application to confirm you complied with these guidelines.

Submission deadline for initial expressions of interest: 12:00 noon (UK time) on **September 22 2026**

OCEMR funding and fees

Each OCEMR studentship will provide successful students with a stipend and fees at the Home UK rate, for three years.
